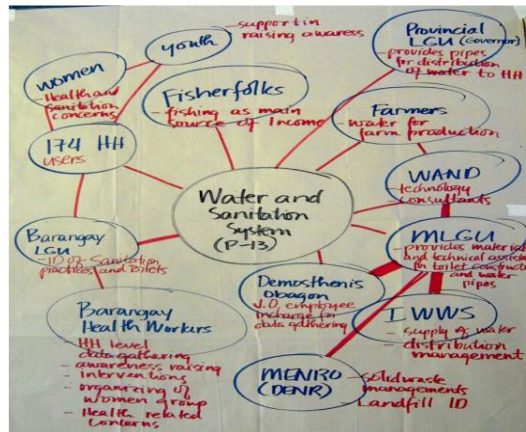

What is Action Plan?

An **action plan** is a document that lists **A sequence of steps/activities to be taken in order to achieve a specific goal.**

Action plan is having three main elements:

1. Specific tasks – **What** will be done
2. Time horizon: **When** it will be done (short – medium – long term)
3. Resource allocation: **Money**, management, legal etc.
4. Responsibility: **Who** is responsible for this action



The action plan should meet several criteria.

Complete

- It should list all the action steps or changes to be sought in CSP in all relevant sectors (e.g., technical, financial, management, social etc.)?

Clear

- It should be clear who is responsible for what and by when to achieve

Current

- It should be based on your current status
- It should reflect the all ongoing works to avoid duplications
- It should consider ongoing/upcoming govt. schemes, proposed projects, laws/regulations etc. in sanitation sector



1st step – List all identified goals

- Open defecation free city
- Integrated Solid Waste Management – source segregation, door to door collection, treatment, recycle/reuse & disposal
- Implement a septage management with clear roles and responsibilities
- Make open drains/spaces & roads litter-free
- 100 cost recovery in sanitation sector
- 24 X 7 complaint redressal system



2nd Step: Identify specific actions for each goal

Goal: To make XXXX city open defecation free

1. Detailed survey of existing facilities and identify open defecation areas
2. Repair and upgradation of existing public/community toilets
3. Construction of new public and community toilets in Open Defecation areas
4. Support private households (without toilet facilities) for construction of household toilet facilities through subsidies, grant etc.
5. Initiate phasing out of dry latrines
6. Develop system for sustainable management of public toilet facilities

Categories actions into: Technical, financial, local administration, capacity development, IEC, legal provisions



3rd Step: Detail out the actions

Divide large tasks into smaller, more manageable steps/activities to understand steps/activities which are/can be:

Example 1:

Action: Repair and upgradation of existing public/community toilets

1. Preparation of estimates
2. Tendering
3. Award of contract

Example 2:

Action: Door to door collection system to be implemented

1. Assessment of current system and requirements of no./type of vehicles
2. Preparation of estimates, identification of funding source
3. Tendering
4. Procurement
5. Deployment of vehicles for door to door collection



4th Step: Structuring actions of each goal according to timelines and priorities

- **Short term actions:** On-going projects, easy to implement, funds available, high political will, etc.
- **Medium term actions:** Pre-planning requirements, funding options to be explored, prior legal provision required
- **Long term actions:** Large scale infrastructure project, require short-term and medium term actions to be completed, long-term changes in institutional structure
